- 2. What you do

- 2. **What you do:** Outside of my studies, I work at the information technology help desk at Webster, where I assist faculty, staff, and students with a range of technical issues.

## Tips for Success

Write variations of your networking pitch to prepare for any industry event where you will exchange information with like-minded professionals.

Challenge yourself when writing by asking yourself "so what?" and "why is this important?"

Memorize your pitch and practice its delivery in front of friend.

Deliver your pitch with consistent eye contact

Prepare to engage in a conversation about the information you share. Actively listen to what is being said and contribute to the conversation on-topic.
