6. Please ask your guests to refrain from taking photos during the ceremony. The graduates will approach the stage one campus at a time. When it is your turn, you will hand your information card (distributed during sign-in), which lists your name and degree, to the announcer. You will then proceed onto the stage where another stage official will hand a Congratulatory Letter to you and you will pause for the photographer.
